

Peace on Earth"

There's a song I really enjoy listening to every year during Advent. It's called "Do You Hear?" and is sung by James David Carter. The chorus features the following words:

Do you hear what I hear
Do you see what I see
A child is born for all the world
A song of joy fills the earth
Do you hear what I hear

After the final singing of the chorus, at the end of the song, one final phrase is repeated: "Peace on earth."

As I read the prophecies about how the Messiah will bring peace on earth, something I find myself wondering is how it could be that the Messiah has come but there still appears to be no peace on earth. Do you ever wonder the same thing?

While I know that some of the "peace on earth" foretold through the prophets was a peace between people and God (and that Jesus very clearly brought that peace about), I still find that at least SOME of the peace foretold was peace among people. Why don't we yet realize that peace?

I don't know where you come out on this question, but I'll provide a little insight into my own answer. I believe Jesus made "peace on earth" among people a real possibility by his words and actions. However, like God had done so often in the past, God required that we, people, follow the example God gave in Jesus in order for this peace among people to be realized. Sadly, we're not doing a great job of following on this one.

But there is hope, and there is something you can do. Actually, the two are one and the same. YOU can make a difference for "peace on earth" by following Jesus' example of showing love to your neighbors, all your neighbors in life, even the ones you don't particularly like. When all of us followers of Jesus actually FOLLOW Jesus in this way, Jesus' love shown through our actions will spread through all the earth, and peace will finally be achieved.

Baker cranks out 162 desserts for Salvation Army's Thanksgiving

It was difficult not to drool over the divine smell of baked apples and freshly made crust wafting from a warehouse at the Salvation Army on Wednesday. Rows of apple pies lined the shelves, each one a golden brown creation, scored with apples peeking through and the crusts crimped like miniature, flaky mountain ranges.

Lamar Edwards, 77, of Grand Junction is responsible for this culinary feat, this year creating 162 pies from scratch for the Salvation Army's Thanksgiving feast. Rather quietly and without fanfare, Edwards has been going about this pie-making business for the nonprofit organization for at least the past 15 years.

"I'm just doing it because I can," he said matter of factly in front of a backdrop of dozens of pies. "I'm just doing it because it needs to be done."

Edwards' pies cap the lip-smacking grand finale of the annual Thanksgiving meal today, which feeds thousands of people each year..

Edwards actually created a total of 192 pies this year. He delivered 30 to his church, First Christian Church, 1326 N. First St., which hosts about 300 people at its annual Thanksgiving feast. While the thought of creating one or two pies for a Thanksgiving meal may elicit a bout of anxiety in the best of cooks, Edwards shrugs off his conquest. He scoffs when asked if he's ever seen the faces of those tasting his pies.

"I'm low profile. In fact, this is making me embarrassed," he said about being interviewed for a story.

In order to make nearly 200 pies, Edwards starts the process in mid-October, a couple weeks after his annual return from fishing in Alaska. Edwards, a lifelong avid ocean fisherman and hobby boatmaker and carpenter, professes attention to detail in most everything he does.

It's no surprise he runs a tight ship in the small kitchen in the 1950s Redlands home he shares with his wife, Joyce Whittwer.

He'll take one day to make dough for 32 pies, weighing 64 dough balls (crusts for the top and bottom) to ensure each are nine ounces. The next day he'll roll the dough and make pies, baking six at a time in the oven. When a batch of 32 pies is made, he takes them down to the Salvation Army headquarters for freezer storage.

He buys 500 pie tins at a time and purchases bulk supplies at Sam's Club. Edwards uses 16 boxes of apples for the entire project, a donation from Palisade's Peachfork Orchards & Vineyards, 281 33 Road.

"I made everything except the apples," he said with a just a hint of twinkle in his eye.

The first couple years, Edwards purchased dozens of pies and dropped them off for the Thanksgiving meal. He graduated to making about 40 pies, and over the years worked his way up to creating the nearly 200 pies he baked this year.

At 77, Edwards said he'll probably knock off the pie-making hobby at age 80.

Making pies — "anything in a pie shell" — is especially rewarding and delicious, he said.



Why does he do it? "I'm trying to get into heaven," Edwards laughed.



94-year-old turns strangers into relatives at church holiday feast

GRAND JUNCTION, Colo. (KKCO/KJCT)-- There were hundreds of volunteers all over the valley on Thanksgiving. They're working to make sure everyone can celebrate the holiday.

Les Armbruster is 94-years-old, or as he puts it: "Well, I'm kind of 49."

Putting together a Thanksgiving dinner for the community is second nature to him. He and his wife organized one at a church in Denver and brought the tradition to Grand Junction when they moved.

"Found out they didn't have a program like that here, and I said 'why don't we try to start one," Armbruster said.

About five years ago, they served their first turkey dinner at the First Christian Church in Grand Junction. On Thursday, they served about 200 people. That may not be a record-setting number, but no one has ever been turned away.

"We invite them, too, because a lot of them are older, and they don't have anybody to eat with on Thanksgiving...so this is their home." Armbruster said.

Cooking a meal for 200 people is a lot of work.

"We've been here since about 7:30 this morning," David Morgan, volunteer, said.

It's a learning experience for everyone, especially Atticus Mansur, 17, who showed up to volunteer with his brother and grandma after they walked by a sign the church had put up advertising the free meal.

"I've learned that it's always good to help other people instead of just thinking about yourself," he said.

The annual tradition turns a church meeting room into a family room.

"We make it home for them, too, so it's a lot of fun, a lot of work, but a lot of fun," Armbruster said.

But most importantly, it turns strangers into relatives.

"I love all these people. They're my whole family," Armbruster said.

The leftover food they had from their meal was donated to HomewardBound.


