

The Need in Puerto Rico

Last week, Susan and I traveled to Puerto Rico with Rev. Ruben Rodriguez of Mountair Christian Church in Lakewood, Colorado. We traveled to survey the need in Puerto Rico following the devastation caused by Hurricane Maria in September of 2017. Our hope was to discern if there are needs that could be met by the Central Rocky Mountain Region of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in the form of a mission/work trip (or, perhaps, something else -whatever the need dictates.) Following are some of the things we discovered.

- A significant number of Puerto Ricans left the island without returning. While we traveled, we heard estimates of population loss as high as 500,000. December 2018 census data puts the net migration loss at 130,000. Even the lower number represents 3.9 percent of the island's population (which is significant, considering no US state lost even 1% of its population during this time, and most saw increases.)
- The island looks pretty good, but looks can be deceiving. Significant resources have been invested in rebuilding after the devastation, which is great. In fact, to an outsider like me who has never traveled to Puerto Rico before, the island looks great: buildings have been repainted, and tourism business looks brisk (which is very helpful to the local economy.) Yet, upon closer inspection, need remains.
- Barring an extension, I've been told FEMA assistance for individual homeowners will end this summer. With the island looking so good, it makes sense. However, closer inspection reveals that a great number of people have not yet received the help they need, and access to help in the form of FEMA funds will (likely) end soon.
- A number of homes still use tarps as roofs, or at least to cover their leaky roofs. One person with whom we talked said most visitors imagine no one lives in the homes that have tarps or, worse, no roof at all, but that's not the case. Most of the homes that look uninhabitable are, in fact, still the dwelling places of families.
- The need is greatest in the areas most tourists will never see on a visit. I saw the most need in the mountain villages and in small, out of the way, places where the hurricane struck hardest. (Thanks to Ruben for taking us to these out-of-the-way places!)
- There are still piles of rubble that used to be homes and businesses. Will they ever be rebuilt? I don't know. Likely, they are owned by some of the 130,000 who fled. While we were there, we talked to some residents who had just returned from a 16-month exodus to begin the process of rebuilding.

The greatest need today can be fund in repairing, rather than rebuilding. Water damage is just about everywhere. Even repainted houses often have cracks in their roofs that yield water damage whenever the rain comes, which is every day.

I left Puerto Rico with a strong sense that a group of people who want to help will have no difficulty finding opportunities to help in Puerto Rico for a very long time. We *can* do something to help. Now, the question is: *will* we do something to help?

Welcome, Adele Matera

Adele was born in Steger, IL, just south of Chicago where she lived for two years until, during WWII, her father joined the military and started his military career in the Air Force. During her childhood Adele's father's career took them to Cheyenne, WY; Colorado Springs, CO; Riverside, CA; Wiesbaden, Germany; Suitland, MD and Belton, MO. While in Colorado Springs, her parents bought a small chicken farm and Adele spent many Saturdays cleaning and prepping chickens for sale with her family. Chicken is not her favorite food to this day! After moving to Belton, MO, she met Larry Matera on a blind date.

Larry and Adele were married in Belton and six months later moved to Chicago where Larry worked for the Social Security Administration. Adele had graduated from Business School in Kansas City, MO, and worked for a Credit Union. After moving to Chicago Adele worked as the assistant to the Comptroller for the Central Accounting Office of Sears. After one and a half years they relocated to Suitland, MD, and Larry took a job for the Department of Defense at Andrews Air Force Base where their daughter Cindy was born. While in Maryland Larry accepted a position in the Foreign Service with the Department of State in Washington, DC, and Larry and Adele served overseas for 14 years. Their second daughter Dawn was born at their first posting in Paris, France, then their son Kevin was born at their second posting in Bangkok, Thailand before they went to the little country of Dohomey in West Africa which is now called Benin. (Dahomey means "Home of Dan" their first king—it's just west of Nigeria.) They were at Tehran, Iran, leaving there just before the Shah was deposed and the Embassy was taken hostage in the 1970s; their next assignment was La Paz, Bolivia; and their final assignment was San Jose, Costa Rica; before returning to the Department of State in Washington, DC, where Larry continued his service as a security and communications officer. She and her husband brought their children up in a Christian home and were especially involved with the missionaries in Thailand and West Africa (where they helped establish a church that Adele says had 30 members by the time they left), and Costa Rica.

After returning to the states Adele earned her degree as a registered nurse and worked in nursing for two years but due to health issues she returned to work in the business world.

After Larry retired he continued to work as a contractor for the State Department for two years until 1989 when they moved to Denver and began retirement life. In 2000 Larry became ill with myelodysplasia of the bone marrow. While on vacation in British Columbia, Larry felt so much better that they decided to move to Blaine, Washington, near the Canadian border where they lived for three years. During a 2004 visit to Adele's sister in Florida, Larry's disease turned into Acute Leukemia, and he passed away there in February 9, 2005.

While living in Denver before Larry's illness, Adele worked for the Colorado Chapter of the National MS Society for seven years as their director of finance and administration. Longing for a smaller city, Adele found Grand Junction to her liking and had a home built for her here. She arrived last August, came to church and transferred her membership in December. She is eager to get involved and has already joined two CWF groups, FCC Bookworms, helped with Christmas Eve services and plays Mexican Train.

Welcome, Adele. We are so excited to have you join us.

- 3. How did you get your name? Are you named after someone? Do you Like your name? Did you ever want a different name? If so, what/why?
- 4. Do you have siblings? If so, where do you fall into the birth order? Are you close to any/all of your siblings? How are you alike/ different?
