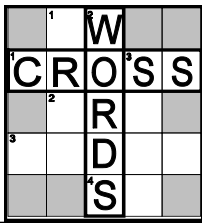

Reflections from my Road Trip

I spent last weekend on a road trip with my oldest son, Cole. We departed Grand Junction on Thursday, spent an evening in Las Vegas, and arrived in Los Angeles on Friday. We spent the bulk of our days Friday-Sunday at Universal Studios and were able to spend our evenings out doing other things, including a virtual reality experience set in the Star Wars universe.

Since I try to view all of my experiences through the lens of God-focus, I'll share some of my reflections from this journey with you:

- I was reminded of the Tower of Babel. There's something about traveling to the big cities, particularly Las Vegas and Los Angeles, that directs my mind to the story from Genesis 11:1-9. When I see the masses of people, the giant hotels/casinos, the efforts to one-up whatever the last biggest thing was, even the world's largest Chevron Station (which was more impressive than I thought possible), I can't help but wonder how God views our efforts. Each time we try to build something bigger and better, are we trying to "make a name for ourselves" that will rival God's name? This one is difficult for me because I very much enjoy some of these things I see and experience.
- I was reminded that humanity is so much more diverse than what I see daily in Grand Junction. While we were in Universal Studios, Cole and I experienced the diversity of God's human creation first-hand. There were as many people from foreign countries in attendance as there were people from the United States. We saw so many people who looked different and heard so many people speaking different languages (which also reminded me of the Tower of Babel.) The diversity provided a reminder that God's creation is so much bigger and richer than what we get to experience on a daily basis.
- I was both inspired by acts of kindness and put off by acts of selfishness. I'm sure it's no surprise that anywhere we go we can find people both living out of the selfless love of Jesus and living out of selfishness. I experienced the kindness of strangers who opened doors for me, smiled at me, and offered patience toward me when I made a misstep or didn't know the correct protocol for the situation. I also experienced the selfishness of people who tried to cheat to get ahead in ride lines, cut me off in traffic, turned to sneeze on me, or took advantage of others (something that appeared to be all too prevalent in downtown Las Vegas.) In all of this, I was clearly reminded of who I want to be: the person who shares love instead of selfishness.
- I got to nurture a relationship. Spending intentional time to be in relationship is important. Jesus made it clear that we can nurture all kinds of relationships; we shouldn't just focus on biological family. However, for this particular weekend, I nurtured my relationship with my son. I was reminded that nurturing loving relationships is always a good idea, always a good thing.

Whenever you endeavor to do something out of the ordinary, whether it's a road trip or something else, I hope you will try to view that experience through the lens of God-focus that you may be reminded of what God taught us through Jesus about how to live best!

Just a little from the Creation Care group

PLASTIC BAGS UGH!!!

Everywhere you look there is another plastic bag. It's like they multiply overnight. We keep saying we need to do something about all those bags we are accumulating, But what? I know if one was to go out on the internet we could find all kinds of things we could make out of plastic bags. I have even seen some pretty interesting things made out of plastic bags in my time at Hobby Lobby. One I really liked was a reusable shopping bag. Go figure! While we know the United States is not the biggest polluters of plastic in our oceans our dumps are filled with all kinds of plastic that will take almost forever before they degrade. That is something I think we can do something about. As a cashier at Hobby Lobby for 10 years I have seen a lot of plastic bags go out the door. I regularly ask my customers if they want a bag and many times they say they don't need one. More people are bringing their own reusable bags. I think the hardest part is to remember to take them out of the car and not just drive them all around the city. While studying the book "Tending To Eden" I got to thinking about how many plastic bags we go through on a daily basis. I averaged 700 customers a day, during the Christmas season it approaches close to 2000 customers many days, and if we give every customer just one bag and there is now 700 stores that is 490,000 bags per day. Are you ready for this number? 152,390,000 bags per year for one company that uses plastic bags and that is a conservative number. The good news is that the Kroger company is going to start to phase out plastic bags and there are others so we are going to be forced to use something different in the future. If you have an idea where we could make usable products out of plastic bags they could be made and sold at the bazaar like we did with the vegetable bags. If you have other ideas on ways to reuse, recycle, or use something different to help in the stewardship of God's creation let any of the members of the Creation Care Committee know. It has been exciting to see how many people have brought their own coffee mugs to use or are using our green mugs during coffee mingle. All of this helps. The more we can reuse an item even if it is plastic the better we will take care of the creation God has blessed us with.

This should make you feel good: **Religion Makes Americans Give**

Religion is the biggest factor that motivates Americans to give money to good causes, said Karl Zinsmeister in *Philanthropy*. The average annual charitable donations of those who went to religious services weekly add up to \$2,935, more than four times those of people who never attended. Of those who attended weekly or prayed daily, 45 percent did volunteer work in any given week, versus 27 percent of those who didn't. "In study after study, religious practice is the behavioral variable with the strongest and most consistent association with generous giving." . . . Thanks to religious efforts, \$44 billion a year is given to overseas charity, and that's more than the total US Government foreign aid budget.

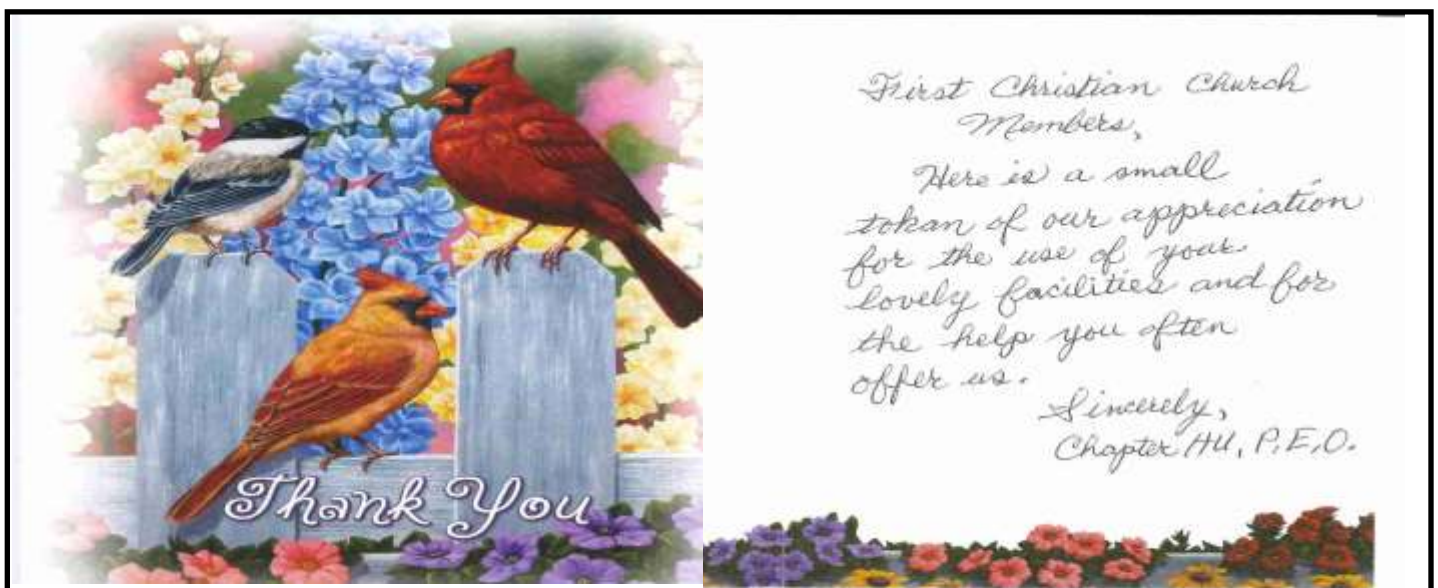
It all began with a lusty cry from my folks bedroom where I was born just as my five brothers and sisters were on a small farm in central Illinois not far from Rte 66. I learned at a early age that everyone has to work together. My father farmed an carpentered. Mother and I raised, cleaned and sold one hundred chickens a summer besides the 100 raised for the family. An acre of strawberries, Japanese Hulless Popcorn, and the children hiring out also helped.

Every Sunday most of the family was in church twice a day and on Wednesday evenings. The afternoon was spent playing baseball, sledding, board games, cards, making fudge and ice cream. Vacation Bible School as well as Sunday School meant learning scriptures, songs, earning attendance pins. But, the big event was in September with evangelist arriving. Not only did we have special "kids" evangelism after school but we were blessed with company for a meal or two.

Hearing Susan discuss "Compassion Week", reminded me that Dad always put in the offering envelope but, somehow, he would pull a twenty dollar bill out of his pocket for a special offering. I always wondered where it came form; not our egg or cream money but somewhere else. My dad spent years as a deacon, elder, teacher, and in a gospel quartet. Mother was always behind the scenes as a servant. I played the piano for services. When the church purchased an organ, the pianist were given free classes. A last, I could kick my shoes off regularly during church.

It was this humble, simple early life, the Armington Christian Church and memories that have sustained me throughout may joys and sorrows from health crisis to travels west and northwest and a failed marriage.

However, the blessings have been many as I have three wonderful children, son-in-law, "gone on ahead" daughter-in-law, three granddaughters, two Master's degrees and an occupation as a Disability Specialist where I have been able to practice my spiritual gift of encouragement (counsel). God's graces continue as I strive, and often stumble, to follow His will.
