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

Reflections on Being Unwell

As most of you know, I have been rather ill lately. More specifically, I've had a flare-up of a chronic autoimmune disease that I've suffered from since 2009. Since my immune system is broken and the medicines the doctors prescribe for me work to break my immune system further, my situation has been particularly troubling as a result of the current COVID-19 pandemic. When my symptoms started turning unusual a few weeks ago - and the doctors had no explanation - the doctors' suspicions turned to COVID-19; that's why I missed a Sunday in worship - I was awaiting the results of a COVID test (that was negative.)

During the past few weeks, while spending most of my time self-quarantining and working to recover from some rather severe symptoms, I spent my time alternating between working (writing sermons, preparing Sunday morning videos and worship materials, managing staff activities from afar, etc.) and praying/reflecting. I'd like to share with you some of my reflections from this time of illness:

• Relationships (With People) Always Matter, But They Matter MORE When We're Unwell. While in great pain and often unable to perform simple activities for myself, I had little choice but to rely on others. I don't know if I could have avoided a lengthy hospital stay without the help of my family. I am certain First Christian Church continued to function well due to all the people who stepped up to help! And I felt the prayers of the many who were praying for me. I'm not suggesting you build relationships for the sole purpose of receiving support during your times of need; rather, I am suggesting relationships matter - always! Work on them.


• Relationship (With God) Always Matters, But It Matters MORE When We're Unwell. During these past few weeks, I have needed God's strength to carry me. In moments in which I wondered if I had the strength to keep going (I was in serious pain!), I found strength and peace from God. My daily reflections, my regular prayers and scripture reading, and even my preparation for Bible Study and sermons helped significantly. Here's what I learned: it wasn't the specific prayers about my illness that lent me God's strength but was rather the continuation of my regular relational activities with God (that have been decades in the making) that made all the difference. Develop a strong relationship with God EVERY day, and it will make all the difference when you're struggling!

• God Has Been My Greatest Antidote to Despair. It's so easy to despair when we become ill. During multiple times in the past few weeks, I have wondered if the pain and other incredibly annoying symptoms would ever cease. During those times, the primary thing that got my mind out of despair was my consideration of God's plan and God's future. Somehow, some way, I knew God would prepare a way for me. I had no idea what it would be, but I knew God would provide something, which got me out of despair.

If, in the near or distant future, you find yourself suffering from COVID or some other illness, I hope these reflections will be helpful to you!


