

Living in the Past, Present, and Future

As I've watched events unfold around us these past few months - COVID, protests, violence, new/changed political movements - I've been thinking quite a bit about how God calls us to live, particularly as our living relates to the past, present, and future.

• Past - I recall God's ancient people erecting monuments for future people to look upon and remember, which suggests some level of living by looking back to the past. I also recall the great festivals of God's people being bound up in remembrance of things past. Does this mean we're supposed to spend most of our time dwelling on the past and allowing our past-focus be our primary input for how we live in the here and now? And of whatever time we're supposed to spend focusing on the past, what types of things from our past should we focus upon most: terrible things like slavery or amazing things like God's gift of Jesus or some other type of things?

• Present - I recall Jesus telling his followers to live in the present, trusting God to provide and not worrying about tomorrow. Does this mean we're supposed to spend most of our time living in the present moment? If so, what are we supposed to be doing with this present-focus: living for ourselves and those close to us, trying to meet the needs of people we've never met on the other side of the world, or meeting the needs of people right in front of us?

• Future - I recall the Apostle Paul writing about hope for what God will do in the future being a primary input regarding how to live in the here and now. It seems like Paul lived predominantly out of his future hope. Does this mean we're supposed to spend most of the focus of our time contemplating this future hope as a means of deciding how to live today?

I hope you can see that many of the conflicts in our time have to do with different answers to the basic question of which period - past, present, or future - should be the primary input for how we live right now. Some people are dwelling on the distant past as their primary input; most of these folks are outraged at events and attitudes from the past. Some other people are focusing quite a bit on the future - a desire to re-shape society into something completely different than what it is. And still some other people are focusing predominantly on the here and now, with much less regard for either past or future.

Obviously, God calls us to consider all three - past, present, and future - as we make choices today. But, which should have priority? And how could God's desired balance for focus on past, present, and future help guide us - and society - through these difficult times? This will be the premise of my next sermon series that begins August 2.




