Kevin's Korner

Last Sunday morning my sermon spoke of how prayer and praise in worship serve as ways to practice living in God's kingdom. We learned from Jesus in his life and teachings, particularly in the Beatitudes shared in his Sermon on the Mount, that we can live in relationship with God, like Jesus did, right now in our everyday lives. Jesus called this way of living in relationship with God, living in the "kingdom of heaven." And we can practice this relationship with God through our worship practices every Sunday morning. One might say, we are what we practice.

We think more about practicing when we want to learn a new sport or activity that we really want to get good at. At Guitar Club, I rarely miss a week reminding people about the power of practicing. I talk a lot about muscle memory, which happens when we repeat a muscular motion over and over until we get good at it. But, there is more to it. Scientists have learned that even in our old age, our brains grow new tendrils in response to repeated practice. And they are coming to an understanding that these tendrils create a connection between our brain and our muscles, which really can't be separated. They become one as the brain and muscles work together. The nerves and muscles actually merge together to swing a golf club, throw a ball, strum a guitar, stitch a cross-stitch pattern, and a million other activities that our bodies and brains practice together.

So, it makes sense that practicing worship and praise can also merge our brains, our muscles and even our spirits (mysteriously), where these practices actually become part of who we are in our daily lives. On Sunday, I was particularly talking about prayer practices, which make prayer, or connecting with God, a part of our lives, even our everyday lives.

This science finds a similar correlation, theologically and practically, as the Apostle Paul writes of the practice of giving to others leading to a growing virtue of generosity. It seems that the action of practice leads to an attitude or virtue of generosity, which, in turn, leads to the further action of a lifestyle of generosity.

More of the same can be said about gratitude, which leads to practices of worship, praise, service and giving, which, in turn, lead to a growing sense of gratitude. When you think about that, you can imagine it snowballing into true joy and peace in one's life. There don't seem to be many drawbacks to any of these practices mentioned, which all find at their source a recognition of God's preeminent grace in our lives.

With all this in mind, I hope you will consider Riecke Claussen's explanation about receiving "estimates of giving" statements this year, rather than asking for a "pledge" to the church. As Riecke said, a pledge insinuates an obligation or a contract of sorts, where an "estimate of giving" recognizes that every contribution to the church is really a gift to the church and to God. This opens the door to a growing practice of giving and generosity, which just might lead to a greater sense of gratitude for all that God has given to us first.

I don't know about you. But this discussion makes me look forward to this coming season of giving and generosity. I'm reminded how grateful I am to God, who always gives first!

Covenant Project: Town Hall "Zoom" Discussion, Thursday, October 13, 6:00 P.M.



The future of the church is more connected. The future of the church is in deeper conversation. The future of the church is a future with deeper covenant. The Covenant Project is the work of changing structures to be more just and relationships across the church to be more connected.

The Covenant Project is an effort to renew our greater church, the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), by enhancing our communication and covenant to being the church that God is calling us to be in the 21st century. The Governance Committee of the General Board has been planning for three years for a more effective ministry together. They are proposing two significant changes; 1) developing a three-year cycle for General Assemblies, including a hybrid meeting every third year with "in person and online" participation; and two years of "online-only" gatherings. This change will allow more people to attend General Assembly while reducing costs as well as other barriers to attend. This greater participation will allow for congregational delegates to gather more frequently for dialogue and discernment, developing "missional priorities," which would be forwarded to the General Board; and 2) creating a new model of the General Board, which would reduce its membership and also allow for more frequent meetings to discuss these "missional priorities" and develop statements of social witness when called for, as well as act on policies and procedures as needed.

This restructuring of leadership in the greater church is under discussion before being submitted to the General Board and then the 2023 General Assembly in Louisville, KY. Our Central Rocky Mountain Region is inviting all churches and members to participate in a Zoom presentation of this new proposal on **Thursday, October 13, at 6:00 P.M.** Pastor Kevin would like to invite you to join him in the Fellowship Hall at this time to participate with others in the region to listen, ask questions and better understand these proposed changes for our church. Please sign-up if you want to participate. You can also participate from home on Zoom, if that works better for you.

JUST FOR FUN-FACTS

Did you know... A Day like Today in History

October 1, 1908 - <u>Henry Ford</u>'s Model T, a "universal car" designed for the masses, went on sale for the first time.

October 2, 1968 - California's Redwood National Park was established. Redwoods are the tallest of all trees, growing up to 400 feet (120 meters) during a lifetime that can span 2,000 years.

October 13, 54 A.D. - Roman Emperor Claudius died after eating mushrooms poisoned by his wife, the Empress Agrippina.

October 15, 1815 - Napoleon Bonaparte arrived on the Island of St. Helena beginning a British-imposed exile following his defeat at the Battle of Waterloo.

October 20, 1968 - Jacqueline Kennedy married multi-millionaire Greek businessman Aristotle Onassis, ending nearly five years of widowhood following the assassination of her first husband, President John F. Kennedy.

Flamingo



When a flamingo spots potential dinner—favorite foods include shrimp, snails, and plantlike water organisms called algae—it plunges its head into the water, twists it upside down, and scoops the fish using its upper beak like a shovel. They are able to "run" on water, thanks to their webbed feet, to gain speed before lifting up into the sky.

Flamingo young are born white, with soft, downy feathers and a straight bill. The bill gradually curves downward as the flamingo matures. Both parents take care of the newborn flamingo, feeding it a fluid produced in their digestive systems. The young leave the nest after about five days to join other young flamingos in small groups, returning to the parents for food. The parents identify their chick by its voice. After about three weeks, the adults herd young flamingos into large groups called crèches where they start to look for food on their own.

Flamingos build nests that look like mounds of mud along waterways. At the top of the mound, in a shallow hole, the female lays one egg. The parents take turns sitting on the egg to keep it warm. After about 30 days, the egg hatches. Most flamingo species are not endangered, although the Andean flamingo is listed as vulnerable, and the Chilean, Lesser, and Puna flamingos are near threatened.
