Kevin's Korner

Great timing! We just finished our Bible study on the Book of Revelation last week. We were reminded that the central saving act of God for all humanity, all creation, all the cosmos, for all time, was accomplished in Jesus dying on the cross, being resurrected to new physical life, and then ascending into heaven. The power of sacrificial love, the love of the Lamb who was slain for our sin, destroyed the powers of fear, oppression, exploitation, false truths; even the power of empire and even death itself.

God accomplished the reconciliation, the putting back in order, of all the world, once and for all, through Jesus. All that is left is for us to embrace this truth and to let it rule our lives. All that is left is for us to join the "Spirit and the bride" (the church), at the end of the Book of Revelation, in proclaiming "Amen. Come, Lord Jesus!" Come into my life, so that I can birth this reality of God's kingdom on Earth today, through testimony and loving service in the name of Jesus, the Lamb who was slain. Come into our lives, as we make this power of love visible within the community of the church.

Celebrating "Christ the King Sunday," this week, we were able to proclaim once again, "Jesus Christ is Lord of all and shall reign as Lord in my life." This is our faith reality. Now how do we make it our life reality? Well, we can't. But God can, if we let Him. There's nothing we can do that will make God's reign, God's kingdom, more real. We can only let it be real in our lives. There's no doing (which is a hard concept for people in the Western world). There is only being, letting it be, letting ourselves be, living in God's kingdom; letting God's kingdom be inside of us, living as if God's kingdom is real and present right now. Because, when we live as if God's kingdom rules are all that matters, then God's kingdom rules *are* all that matter, then God's kingdom rules in our lives, "on Earth as they do in heaven."

Every Sunday, we pray, "Thy kingdom come, on Earth as it is in Heaven." What would happen if we let God answer our prayer in our own lives? The world would change, one life at a time.

Advent begins this Sunday. In worship, we will focus on waiting for Christ to come into our world and into our lives. It's a great focus! But could this be the year that we let Christ be born in our lives? What are we waiting for? What will we do? We will be the church God created us to be. And that will be enough!

Watch out Grand Junction! The kingdom is among you!


Advent begins November 27. "Silent Night" will provide our theme for the season in worship.

The Moravian Star




The Moravian Star is a familiar and popular Christmas decoration. Originating as a geometry exercise at a Moravian boys' school in Niesky, Germany, the complex star shape was later adopted as a symbol of Advent recalling the start that led the wisemen to the savior.

The Star located in Winston-Salem, North Carolina's Trinity Moravian sanctuary was handmade of paper and is over 6 feet in diameter. It was made in 2012 on the 100th anniversary of the congregation replacing a star that had been made in Herrnhut, Germany and was used for over fifty years.

This geometric shape is called a: Great Tessellated Rhombicuboctahedron!



Apple Pie

- Serves: 8
- Prep Time: 40 min
- Cook Time: 45 min
- Calories: 290



Apple Pie Ingredients

What do you need for a traditional apple pie recipe? These common pantry items paired with orchard fresh apples will help you make the best apple pie.

- Pie Crust
- Granny Smith Apples (or a combo of your favorite fresh apples!)
- Salted Butter
- AP Flour
- White and Brown Sugar
- Cinnamon
- Nutmeg (optional, but we think it adds a warming touch)
- Fresh lemon juice
- Eggs

How to Make an Apple Pie

1. Prepare your apples! Peel, core, and cut into equal slices for consistent cooking time. This will ensure a soft crunch.

2. Make your filling! Rich brown sugar and butter combine with a pinch of cinnamon, to make our apple pie filling recipe. Pro Tip: For our thickening agent, we use flour. When the butter combines with the flour, allow it to cook for a full 1-2 minutes. Don't worry if you're not sure when it's done - you'll be able to smell the aromatic nuttiness of the butter and flour together, ensuring a perfect caramel-y thick base for your apples.

3. Prepare your pie crust! If you're making your pie crust from scratch, this step needs to be done ahead of the filling, allowing ample time for it to chill in the fridge. It's important to bake a chilled pie crust, or the crust will droop in the hot oven. Otherwise, store-bought works well, too! Just remember to keep the pie crust in the fridge until ready to fill.

4. Bake! Two different temperatures make for the ideal bake. We start with the oven on 425° F to crisp up the crust and then drop it down to 350° F to get the filling all yummy and bubbly. You can always tent aluminum foil over the top if you see your top crust getting a little too golden brown.

5. Cool and Enjoy! We know it's impossible to wait once you smell the rich spices and fresh pie baking, but for the absolute best apple pie, we recommend waiting until completely cool to dig in.

Did you know... A Day like Today in History

December 1, 1822 - Dom Pedro, founder of the Brazilian Empire, was crowned as the first emperor of Brazil.

December 1, 1988 - Benazir Bhutto was nominated to become prime minister of Pakistan, the first woman to govern a Muslim nation.

December 3, 1984 - A deadly gas leak (of methyl isocyanate) at a Union Carbide plant in Bhopal, India, killed at least 3,000 persons and injured more than 200,000.

December 7, 1787 - Delaware became the first state to adopt the new constitution of the United States of America.

December 14, 1799 - George Washington died at Mount Vernon.

Turkey



6 Facts about Turkeys

1. Only male turkeys gobble

Turkeys make a variety of different sounds such as "purrs," "yelps," and "kee-kees," but the famous "gobble" call is only done by males during mating season.

2. Wild turkeys can fly

It's a common myth that turkeys can't fly (most likely because they feed on the ground), but wild turkeys have been known to fly up to 55 mph in short bursts.

3. Wild turkeys sleep in trees

Turkeys spend most of their time on the ground, but when it's time to sleep, they fly up into trees. This is because turkeys can't see well at night, and to protect themselves from predators, they roost at dusk and fly down at dawn.

4. Their poop determines if they're male or female

One certain way to find out if a turkey is male or female is by checking their droppings. A male's poop will be shaped like the letter J, while the female's is more spiral-shaped.

5. Turkeys can see better than humans

Among the more surprising facts about turkeys is that they have three-times better vision than humans. They can also see in color, and their eyesight covers 270 degrees.

6. 46 million turkeys are killed each year for Thanksgiving

That's about one turkey for every person in Spain. To add, each turkey weighs about 30 pounds on average, which means Americans will consume 1.4 billion pounds of turkey.
