Kevin's Korner

How many believe that our nation and our world can be saved by people sharing warm, sentimental feelings toward each other, especially one's enemies? Jesus did say "Love your enemies." But he also said, "do good to those who hate you." That's different. How many believe that our nation and our world can be saved by people "doing good to those who hate you"? This seems more realistic to me; doing good things for other people, whether they like you or not, whether you like them or not.

On Sunday morning I gave you a definition of the love I think Jesus was talking about. Love is a "commitment to will the good of another." I heard this definition in an internet podcast interview with economist, Arthur Brooks, called "Redeeming a Culture of Contempt." As an economist, Brooks studies interactions between people, institutions and nations. As a Christian economist, he is interested in how interactions between people can work for the good. Often interactions work for the good of one party or the other, but when interactions work for the good of both parties, it is much more likely that an ongoing relationship will result. Whether a financial interaction or a simple personal interaction, if both parties benefit, a relationship of trust is likely to build.

Jesus spent his life on earth interacting with people in ways that offered a better life for them. He healed, he taught, he modeled, he persuaded. Arthur Brooks makes the claim that we, as Christians are called to persuade people "for <u>their</u> own good." We have Good News to share with people that offers them a life filled with hope, joy, peace and love. We have been persuaded to believe this is true. And we can testify that we have experienced this life, in relationship with Jesus. Our testimony can persuade other people to believe this truth, if we can convince them that we are "committed to will <u>their</u> good," that we "love" them, not just through warm, sentimental feelings, but through a decision to act for <u>their</u> good, rather than just <u>our</u> own.



This just makes sense. We have Good News to share. News that can help people to live more wholesome, joy-filled lives. We don't need to worry about our own challenges of growing the church or paying the bills. Just share the Good News for the good of others, not ourselves. I'll bet it will be good for us too. Jesus says so.

HISTORY OF THE DISCIPLES OF CHRIST

In frontier America, the desire for freedom which led to the American Revolution was also felt in religion. Life was hard and people lived by their own ingenuity. They wanted a practical, down-to-earth religion to help them cope and understand their lives. They felt they could read and interpret the Bible themselves and build a faith based on reason. Next to the family, church was the most important social structure. The religions they brought from the old country did not meet their needs in this new life. These new settlers were self-reliant, unbound by tradition, and free of England and its authority. The simple, practical and independent religious movements captured the spirit of these pioneers. When the tiny groups that became the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) sprang up, there was no intention to start another denomination. That was the last thing the founders wanted. They thought of themselves as a movement to restore Christian unity on the basis of the New Testament rather than the old. To be continued....



Friends with Missions Quilt Raffle for Latimer House





Update

The Community Food Bank's Annual Report showed they served over 800,000 meals in 2022. That's 400 tons of food given to 50,000 individuals. Organizations such as FCC donate 7 percent of their total food source. Clients can do their own shopping with the shelves organized, "to make nutritious whole foods the most Convenient, Attractive, and Normal Options." Whether each of us gives groceries or a monetary contribution, we are supporting a program that believes "no one should go hungry in Mesa County".

Starting with 2023, we are also including a graph of the pounds that are pulled out for the Giving Boxes we fill which are located on the church property next to the garden area.

As everyone knows we have had guests staying in our Fellowship hall over the past week and they will be here until February 5th. I want to thank everyone for your help with food, time and prayers. Every day I hear from these men how much they appreciate the good food and a couple of them have mentioned how much they can feel the caring and love when they walk into our church. A special thanks to Lamar and his crew for the work in providing warm breakfasts to these men who go out and spend the day in the chilly weather we have had. We have learned a lot and plan to put that education to use as we go forward in our outreach to the community.

Thanks to all of you and please keep these men in your prayers.

JUST FOR FUN-FACTS

Did you know... A Day like Today in History


February 3, 1870 - The 15th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was ratified, guaranteeing the right of citizens to vote, regardless of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

February 4, 1861 - Apache Chief Cochise was arrested in Arizona by the U.S. Army for raiding a ranch. Cochise then escaped and declared war, beginning the period known as the Apache Wars, which lasted 25 years.

February 11th - Celebrated in Japan as the founding date of the Japanese nation, which occurred with the accession to the throne of the first Emperor, Jimmu, in 660 BC.

February 17, 1909 - Apache Chief Geronimo (1829-1909) died while in captivity at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. He had led a small group of warriors on raids throughout Arizona and New Mexico. Caught once, he escaped. The U.S. Army then sent 5,000 men to recapture him.

February 27, 1991 - In Desert Storm, the 100-hour ground war ended as Allied troops entered Kuwait just four days after launching their offensive against Saddam Hussein's Iraqi forces.



This might explain why airplane food gets such a bad reputation. The elevation in an airplane can have a detrimental effect on our ability to taste things. According to a 2010 study conducted by Germany's Fraunhofer Institute for Building Physics, the dryness experienced at a high elevation as well as low pressure reduces the sensitivity of a person's taste buds to sweet and salty foods by about 30 percent. Add that dry cabin air affects our ability to smell, and our ability to taste is reduced further.

Glass Frog



A small frog the length of a quarter leaps from one plant leaf to another, flaunting its little belly as it soars. The skin on the frog's underside is see-through. So as the amphibian jumps you can view some of its internal organs, including its beating heart. This is a reticulated glass frog, a creature that has a lot of supercool secrets to reveal.

Reticulated glass frogs can be found in the rain forests of Costa Rica, Panama, Colombia, and Ecuador.

These animals, which are active at night, inhabit vegetation along streams. Males can get pretty territorial, making squeaking noises to warn trespassing frogs to stay away from their leafy hangout spots. If an intruder doesn't leave, the frog will wrestle it to show who's boss.

Males are also very protective of their mates' eggs. Females lay a mass of eggs (called a clutch) on the underside of leaves, sticking them in place with a jellylike substance. Afterward, the females leave and the males go on guard duty. They watch the eggs 24/7 until they hatch, protecting them from enemies such as wasps. The frog has even been known to kick away wasps that get too close to the egg cluster!
