Kevin's Korner

I love starting my day reading my favorite mystic, Richard Rohr, in his Daily Meditation from the Center for Action and Contemplation. His writings and thoughts are especially helpful when I start feeling like all the challenges and obstacles of the world and life are just too much to bear. Richard has a way of communicating a sense of Hope that there is a greater truth beyond what we can find on TV or in the newspaper. In fact, this week he writes about a truth that is more basic than any human developments; a truth that is built into the very foundations of the created world.

Boiled down, Richard teaches that because God is Love, God needs to be in a loving relationship and so creates "loved creations," from the tiniest molecules of star dust, which all of us are made up from, to the largest galaxies, which we are just now getting to know exist. And because God is Love, God puts a bit of Godself into every particle of every piece of creation. As the Gospel of John says, "...and without him (Jesus) not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people."

So, when I start to get discouraged, I remember that not only is God present, but God is part of everything I can see or experience during my day, and thus God has a purpose for everything, myself included, this church included, this community included, even the mosquitoes, even the things I dislike or disagree with, even the things I don't understand. As we prepare to start a New Year, we can look around us and know that everything we see, or don't see, has a purpose. And deep down every little piece of stardust has a bit of God's love inside and thus a big piece of potential for good.

I find comfort in thinking about these things. I also find hope that God is at work through every one of these particles of stardust, loving and creating a mosaic of beauty and life that will pull every single piece into God's plan for good and love and completion. And God wants to use us to bring His beautiful plans to complete fruition. Furthermore, God still wants to use Christ's church to partner and labor side-by-side with Him.

The Covenant Project – Winter Bible Study

Pastor Kevin will lead a Winter Bible study called The Covenant Project, from the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). This will be a 5 week study on Wednesday mornings (Thursday evenings, 6:30 to 8 pm.) from 10:30 to 12:00 am. It will explore foundational theological foundations of Disciples and inform us of coming structural changes being proposed for the General church. It will conclude in time for our Lenten Study on David, "Leap Over a Wall," written by Eugene Peterson (who translated the Message Bible), beginning on February 22nd, (Books can be ordered ahead of time).

The Design of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), the document that governs our common life together, begins with a Preamble that reads more like a hymn than a governing document. In it, we find an affirmation of our faith, an expression of hope, a call to service, and a reminder of "God's covenant of love that binds us to God and to one another."

That covenant is written into the Preamble, but it is lived out through covenantal relationships in all expressions of the church. This curriculum is an opportunity for Disciples to explore the notion of covenant within our faith tradition, and to deepen our commitment to living in covenant with each other.

This is a 5 week study including: Week 1 – God's Covenant of Love; 2 A Movement for Wholeness; 3 The Bonds of Christian Faith; 4 The Light of Scripture; and 5 God's Limitless Love.




READ THROUGH THE BIBLE IN A YEAR

Pastor Kevin is finishing up reading through the Bible for the 20? something time? This year he listened to the NIV version on an internet Bible app. There are many different versions of the Bible, many Bible apps and many patterns for reading through the Bible in a year. I suggest one in particular as a Chronological reading pattern, which skips through the Bible in a few places and removes the repeated portions of the Old Testament (mostly the Books of Chronicles 1 and 2). This pattern can help the reader follow the historical flow of our Biblical story of faith. These will be left on the table at the sanctuary entrance.

I do try to use a different translation of the Bible, or paraphrase each year, which I think helps me to listen in a new way. The NRSV, which we use in worship is a good start. I really like it. But I also really like "The Message" Bible (paraphrase by Eugene Peterson). This year, he is trying the CEV Bible for the first time, as it is recommended for easy reading and understanding for modern readers.

Many of today's church leaders grew up in church. We remember a time when church attendance was simply the thing you did every Sunday. And as church leaders or volunteers, it's what we still do every Sunday. So at times, it can be a little hard to empathize with people who don't see things the way we see them.

And...here's the danger...if you start judging people for not seeing it your way, (consciously or unconsciously) you almost certainly turn them off. People-especially teens and young adults-can smell judgment a mile away. Judgment creates barriers.

So what do you do instead? Empathize.

If a formerly unchurched person shows up 12 times a year, that's far more than they've ever been in church! They might think they're doing great, and maybe they are compared to how they used to feel spiritually. So rather than judging them for it, tell them they're doing great. And invite them into a deeper conversation about faith and life.

Somewhere along the way, many of us confused the mission and the method.

Your mission is to lead people into a relationship with Jesus, not to get people to show up for an hour in a box every Sunday.

Please hear me... I value our time together on Sundays as a church. And I think it's presently one of our very best vehicles through which to advance the mission of the church.

But our mission is not to fill seats on a Sunday. It's to lead people to Jesus.

You should be obsessed with your mission, not with filling seats.

if you really help people move into an authentic relationship with Jesus Christ, they might show up more regularly in your church on Sunday. Ironic, isn't it?

Church leaders are programmed to measure inputs, not outputs.

We measure how many people showed up, what they gave, who they brought and even online traffic. But rarely do we measure outputs. What if the church became as much a sending organization as a receiving organization?

What if you developed ways to measure spiritual growth? Like, how much time do people spend with God personally each day reading scripture and praying? The stats are surprisingly low. According to a recent study, 57% of Americans read their Bible four times a year or less. Only 26% read it more than 4 times a week.

What if you helped the people around your church change that?

And what if you got innovative and started thinking through whether people were better off five years after joining your church than were before? Or whether they feel closer to Christ? Or whether they're making a difference in their workplaces and neighborhoods? What if you helped them be the church, not just go to church?

Leaders get passionate about what they measure. So measure thoughtfully.



Those pesky electrical bills have everyone at home doling out extra dollars each month.

Consequently, many of us wear extra layers to stave off the cold at home, and that's a good policy to follow at church as well. Hopefully, everyone is doing what they can to keep the electrical bills at the church from skyrocketing. Maintaining a 70 degree temperature in the sanctuary during Sunday service may require an extra sweater to keep warm. Don't forget the lap blankets near the doors for extra warmth.






A Happy Home Recipe

JUST FOR FUN-FACTS

Did you know... A Day like Today in History

January 1, 1863 - The Emancipation Proclamation by President Abraham Lincoln freed the slaves in the states rebelling against the Union.

January 4, 1790 - President George Washington delivered the first State of the Union address.

January 11, 1964 - The U.S. Surgeon General declared cigarettes may be hazardous to health, the first such official government report.

January 15, 1559 - Elizabeth Tudor, daughter of Henry VIII and Anne Boleyn, was crowned as Elizabeth I in Westminster Abbey.

January 17, 1773 - The ship Resolution, sailing under Captain James Cook, became the first vessel to cross the Antarctic Circle.

January 25, 1961 - President John F. Kennedy conducted the first live televised presidential news conference, five days after taking office.

January 30, 1972 - In Londonderry, Northern Ireland, 13 Roman Catholics were killed by British troops during a banned civil rights march. The event became known as Bloody Sunday.



According to *Guinness World Records*, "set" has the largest number of meanings of any word in the English language, with 430 different senses listed in the 1989 edition of Second Edition of the *Oxford English Dictionary*. The word "sets" the record with an entry running 60,000 words, or 326,000 characters, and no other English word has come close since.

Seahorse



You'll find seahorses in the world's tropical and temperate coastal waters, swimming upright among seaweed and other plants. Seahorses use their dorsal fins (back fins) to propel slowly forward. To move up and down, seahorses adjust the volume of air in their swim bladders, which is an air pocket inside their bodies.

Tiny, spiny plates cover seahorses' bodies all the way down to their curled, flexible tails. The tail can grasp objects, helpful when seahorses want to anchor themselves to vegetation.

A female seahorse lays dozens,

sometimes hundreds, of eggs in a pouch on the male seahorse's abdomen. After seahorse moms make their eggs, they pass them over to the males to carry until the young are released. When it's time to give birth, the dad pumps water through the pouch, releasing hundreds of fry, or baby seahorses, in just a few minutes. Called a brood pouch, it resembles a kangaroo's pouch for carrying young. Seahorses young hatch after up to 45 days in the brood pouch. The baby seahorses, each about the size of a jelly bean, find other baby seahorses and float together in small groups, clinging to each other using their tails. Unlike Kangaroos, baby seahorses do not return to the pouch. They must find food and hide from predators as soon as they're born.
