Kevin's Korner

What an exciting beginning to the New Year! After our calm and fun New Year's celebration Game Day, it soon

became clear that we were needed to fill a gap for overflow refuge housing for a group of our unhoused neighbor gentlemen. Wow! Did we ever have to hit the ground running! Too many people to name all that were essential for a successful mission effort. You know who you are, and THANK YOU!!!

I was reminded of the words of several church leadership experts since the beginning of Covid. A consistent trait identified in effective churches, now, and into the future, is called 'nimbleness.' In churches, that is the description of churches who are aware of their surroundings, the trends heading into the future, and any significant shifts in 'winddirection,' like community needs. Oh yes, and the ability to quickly adapt to the new reality even as it is only just beginning to appear. Well, First Christian Church family and friends; we did just that! It wasn't all pretty. Certainly, there was some stress. But, I can only use the word, 'beautiful,' to describe what I saw happening right inside our big ol' church building. We were nimble in our daily schedules, nimble in volunteering, being flexible, and donating time (including sleep time) and talents, and treasures.

Our guests experienced a level of hospitality that many of them said, they could not remember experiencing before. And, when not dragging with exhaustion, the hosts experienced a level of joy they won't soon forget. We all learned a lot too, which ought to make it a bit easier next time and make for an even more satisfying experience for all involved. Do please add your evaluations and suggestions in the next few weeks.

Our experience gave us plenty to talk about in our first two Pastor's Cabinet meetings of the year. We have a good start on our planning for 2023 and our communication about planning, and learning, and growing as a church. Part of our Cabinet discussion was an exercise called S.W.O.T., which many of you are familiar with. It stands for Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats (I included temptations in the threats). This exercise is designed to help us better understand ourselves and our neighborhood and community around us. I want to share our observations.



I invite you to give us feedback on what you think we might have missed, but also the observations that you believe are especially important for our church as we continue through 2023 and beyond. Here we go: (Do give us some grace, as some of these observations were in hopes of getting even better at some important factors.)

Weakness: Age, building, conversation, could be more friendly, traditions, involvement, and energy level.

Threats (temptations): Park, unhoused, "they", fear of failure, fear, negativity, status quo, evangelism, rejection, <u>communication (early, often, more often)</u>, hearing.

Opportunities: 20,000 square feet, 1.85 acre, neighborhood, congregation, growing community, location, park, unhoused, Guitar Club, display kindness and welcome – radiate love and Christian principles, "We", Hope, Spring is coming.

Strengths: Congregation, location, age, building and grounds, friendly, diverse, new involvement, "made it happen", Nimble, Lamar (and Joyce, and all of you)!

You see I did not go in order, because I wanted to leave you with the positive observations, which outnumbered the negatives. I hope you read these observations and find hope for our future, and our present. I also hope you will consider the negatives and think about ways we can turn them into positive opportunities, even if it would take a lot of work. I hope you will pray about these observations and ask God what we ought to do with both the negatives and positives. And I hope you will give your own observations about our reality at First Christian Church and the possibilities that might arise, when mixed with God's kingdom realities and possibilities. According to the January 6 edition of *The Week*, **hearing aids** may cut your risk of developing dementia. A study involving more than 4,300 American adults, average age 68, found that those with untreated hearing loss were more than twice as likely as those without to develop mild cognitive impairment, a precursor to dementia. There was no significant difference in risk between those with normal hearing and those who used hearing aids. "This implies that use of hearing aids may help mitigate cognitive decline associated with hearing loss," say the authors, "offering an actionable strategy" to prevent dementia.

Also in that same issue, it mentioned that **A SENSE OF WONDER** can improve your enjoyment of life. If you have a strong appreciation for moments of beauty, you are more likely to feel that your existence is meaningful. HISTORY OF THE DISCIPLES OF CHRIST – PART 2

Barton Stone was a Presbyterian minister in Bourbon Co, KY. He was born in 1772 in Maryland and attended

David Caldwell's academy near Greensboro, NC and completed the classical course in 1793. His plan was to practice law but after hearing a young New Light Presbyterian minister whose sermon concerned the love and grace of God, he was promptly converted and decided he would be a Presbyterian preacher. In 1801 a tremendous camp meeting was held around the Presbyterian church at Cane Ridge, KY, where Stone was pastor. Ministers from several denominations worked together preaching the gospel to crowds estimated at 20,000. This experience of cooperation made a deep impression on Stone. Plus, this large revival meeting convinced Stone and other Presbyterian ministers in the area the Calvinist doctrine that Christ died only for the "elect" was untrue. Five ministers withdrew from the Synod of Kentucky in 1803 and organized the independent Springfield Presbytery. Less than a year later, that little presbytery was dissolved with the publication of one of the most significant documents in Disciples history. It was called "The Last Will and Testament of the Springfield Presbytery." Major sections of the "mock will" contend that the people should have "free

course to the bible," which is "the only sure guide to heaven," and that local congregations should govern themselves. The Stone-led movement took the name "Christian" because it was biblical and nonsectarian. The group continued to be evangelistic and spread through the Midwest with settlers from Kentucky. Strictly congregational, the Christians were slow to develop organizations. Their so-called "conferences" were little more than rallies at which the congregations of an area could share reports.

JUST FOR FUN-FACTS

Did you know... A Day like Today in History

March 1, 1961 - President John F. Kennedy established the Peace Corps, an organization sending young American volunteers to developing countries to assist with health care, education and other basic human needs.

March 4, 1681 - King Charles II of England granted a huge tract of land in the New World to William Penn to settle an outstanding debt. The area later became Pennsylvania.

March 10, 1880 - The Salvation Army was founded in the United States. The social service organization was first founded in England by William Booth and operates today in 90 countries.

March 24, 1934 - The Philippine Islands in the South Pacific were granted independence by President Franklin D. Roosevelt after nearly 50 years of American control.

March 25, 1807 - The British Parliament abolished the slave trade following a long campaign against it by Quakers and others.

March 27, 1977 - The worst accident in the history of civil aviation occurred as two Boeing 747 jets collided on the ground in the Canary Islands, resulting in 570 deaths.



It is not known whether William Morrison had an ulterior motive for inventing the soft confection, but the dentist no doubt helped ensure others in his profession continued drawing in plenty of customers. In 1897, he partnered with candy-maker John C. Wharton to develop the cotton candy machine (which at the time was known as "Fairy Floss"), and it's been bringing kids cavities ever since.

Bottlenose Dolphin



Bottlenose dolphins squeak, squawk and use body languageleaping as high as 20 feet in the air, snapping their jaws, slapping their tails on the surface of the water, blowing bubbles and even butting heads. Each dolphin has a special whistle that it creates soon after it is born. This whistle is used for identification, just like a human's name. Dolphins also produce high frequency clicks. which act as a sonar system called echolocation (ek-oh-low-KAY-shun). When the clicking sounds hit an object in the water, like a fish or rock, they bounce off and come back to the dolphin as echoes. Echolocation tells the dolphins the shape, size, speed, distance, and location of the object.

Dolphins grow to be anywhere from 6 to 12 feet long. They shed their outermost layer of skin every two hours. AARP, in their December/January issue, had an article concerning adopted children from Vietnam, most of whom are biracial. One of the adoptees said a nun in Vietnam once told her: "Coincidence is God's way of staying anonymous." A quick update on Annie Grogan who moved to the west coast last year.
