# **Kevin's Korner**

Riecke Claussen and I enjoy reading daily emails from church consultant, Carey Niewhof. Here's a recent one:

Niewhof tells of an ongoing discussion between church leaders on whether we should choose "sharing the gospel," evangelism and church growth; or growing healthy disciples. He explains that most mainline churches like us have chosen in the modern era to focus on discipleship, growing healthy disciples in our church, rather than sending people out to share the Good News. Some churches try to find a balance between both priorities. But, I have to say, being around a lot of Disciple churches, most of our churches put their emphasis on discipleship, particularly growing disciples from their own children and youth. I think this worked well right up to World War II, but not very well since. I suspect First Christian has a similar history to most of our Disciple congregations, in that we've put an emphasis on Christian Education and youth ministries often to find that the young disciples who graduate from our youth programs move on out of the church, or to other churches and other denominations. Not many have stayed with us as adults, nor joined us from other Disciple youth ministries. Not many regularly attend any church.

We're not alone. Carey Niewhof has witnessed this in churches around North America, from all denominations. He suspects that many other churches have made the same decision to focus on discipleship (of all ages), or growing disciples, rather than focusing on sharing the Good News. I've served churches that have made this decision consciously, or have just abdicated the Evangelism part due to discomfort in sharing the Good News. It's really hard to get mainline church folks (Disciples included) to get excited about sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ. It's hard to get some pastors excited about this, beyond their own doors.

Carey Niewhoff has a simple observation from the Bible: "Jesus Commanded Us To *Make* Disciples, Not *Be* Disciples." He continues, "The way many Christians talk, you'd think Jesus told us to *be* disciples. He commanded us to *make* disciples. The Great Commission is, at its heart, an *outward* movement. Could it be that in the act of making disciples, we actually become more of who Christ designed us to be? It was in the act of sharing faith that thousands of early Christians were transformed into new creations.

This rings true to me. I think we've done a better job of teaching people to love their church and church people than to love and serve Jesus and to love the world as God does. I think the world can see this and chooses to walk away from the church more and more.

Now, I don't want to get too negative about the past, or even the present. I'd rather take a look into the future. Do you think that God would rather have great churches, or even great disciples, or would God rather have people, lots and lots of people who know God and who try to walk with God, however imperfectly that effort turns out to be? Niewhoff goes a step further to suggest that perhaps the best way to be and to grow as a disciple is by making disciples, by sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ. Remember, he pointed out, "Jesus Commanded Us To *Make* Disciples,"

So, my question, as we look forward toward our future as First Christian Church, should we 1) focus more on being a great church, filled with great disciples, and watch what happens inside our church? Or, should we 2) focus on making disciples all around our neighborhood and our community? Carey Niewhoff suggests that maybe we'd be better at becoming that first choice if we kept our focus on the second choice.

### **HISTORY OF THE DISCIPLES OF CHRIST – PART 4**

There were others influential in Christian Church beginnings. Two of these were Walter Scott and "Raccoon" John Smith. Walter Scott, who was zealous, inventive and impulsive, provided the Disciples with an effective evangelism method. As evangelist of the Mahoning Baptist Association in eastern Ohio, he devised a "five-finger exercise" outlining the steps in conversion—faith, repentance, baptism, remission of sins, and gift of the Holy Spirit. In the fingers of one hand, Scott had a visual aid for teaching a lesson children could understand and pass along to their parents. Long after their separation from the Baptists, the Disciples were using Scott's evangelism methods.

"Raccoon" John Smith of Kentucky was an unschooled but intelligent Baptist preacher. He became a reformer after meeting Alexander Campbell and baptized so many converts that he was called "the Dipper." He spread the fire of reform so rapidly that former Baptist friends became his fierce enemies. Smith was in Kentucky when Scott was in Ohio, the evangelist who popularized the Disciples movement.


The two groups—Christians and Disciples—inevitably discovered each other since they had much in common. Yet there were differences—the Christians had a higher regard for the clergy than the Disciples did. Stone and Alexander Campbell exchanged editorial jabs in their publications while the possibility of union was being discussed, and the two never became close friends.


Union of Christians and Disciples is dated from a meeting in Lexington, KY, on New Year's Day 1832. "Raccoon" John Smith was chief spokesman for the Disciples and Barton Stone represented the Christians. Their handshake, followed by the giving of "the hand of friendship" among the rest of the participants, constituted approval. Actual union took several years. Smith from the Disciples side and John Rogers from the Christians were selected to ride together among the congregations completing the merger. An estimated 12,000 Disciples and 10,000 Christians came together in those early years of the 1830's.

Both names lived on. What was wanted was a New Testament name befitting a movement that would reunite the church. Alexander Campbell was sure "Disciples" or "Disciples of Christ" was ideal. He argued that it was descriptive and ancient (since followers of Jesus were known as disciples before they were called Christians). But Stone was equally satisfied with "Christians." He convinced Thomas Campbell and Walter Scott, but not Alexander.

Jerry Laubhan joined FCC in August, 2021, but before an interview was scheduled his health limited his activities; however, life has improved somewhat for Jerry, and we sat down to visit about his life so far. He was born in Wiggins, CO, and lived on a farm there until he was 11 years old. Wiggins, just west of Fort Morgan, is good farm country, and their 640 acres raised many crops over the years while it was owned by Jerry's family. Jerry's father died at the age of 53 shortly after the family moved to Greeley; then his mother rented the property to sharecroppers for several years.

Jerry is the youngest of three boys. His one brother was 11 years older, and the other brother Ken was just 21 months older and saw to it that Jerry was involved in all sports with the "older guys". Consequently, Jerry was a good athlete playing all school sports and then golf and tennis when he was older.

His working career included several companies. His first job was with Allstate in customer service as a supervisor in the Denver Office and, after several years, had assignments in San Diego and Pasadena, California, before being transferred to their headquarters in the Chicago area in 1978 as the leader of the Customer Service Group and was there for five years. He then moved to New York and became the third employee of an upstart company called Prodigy which was owned by Sears and IBM. This was when computers were just coming into being, and Prodigy guided people and organizations in navigating this new tool. The company grew to over 2000 employees, and Jerry was the leader of the group called Member Services which included Customer Service, Technical Support and Telemarketing.

He later worked for eight years in New York for Siemens IT Services. Siemens IT (Information Technology) Services provided IT support for large companies, and Jerry functioned as the Director of Sales for the Northeast Region. He then began work for several years as a Principal Consultant for a Tennessee-based company called New Leaf Partners that provided consulting expertise in Sales and Customer Service for several large companies.

At the age of 68 Jerry retired to Oro Valley, Arizona, but quickly got bored, so he took a job at a fancy time-share resort where he worked at the front desk helping guests with various needs.

He has been in Grand Junction for over four years, but in early 2020 was diagnosed with MDS (Myelodysplastic Syndrome), which is a blood cell cancer, and for him, results in a low red blood cell count causing severe fatigue. Currently Jerry is feeling stronger and has been attending the night sessions of Bible Study with Pastor Kevin, as he is able to function better later in the day.

Jerry moved to Grand Junction to be close to his daughter and grandson who live with her husband in Palisade. Jerry also has a son and two other grandchildren.

We hope to see more of Jerry in the future as his health permits.

## Did you know... A Day like Today in History

**Birthday** - <u>King George III</u> (1738-1820) was born. He ruled England for 60 years from 1760 to 1820 and was the British King against whom the <u>American Revolution</u> was directed.

# Beaver



Beavers are powerful swimmers that can swim underwater for up to 15 minutes. As the beaver dips underwater, the nose and ears shut to keep water out.

Transparent inner eyelids close over each eye to help the beaver see. Beavers are the second largest rodents in the world, behind the South American capybara. Second only to humans, beavers alter their environment more than any other organism on the planet. These tireless animal engineers face the challenges of predators and the full fury of the elements.

Average lifespan: Up to 24 years. A beaver can weigh up to 60 lbs. Their group name is called a colony. Beavers are herbivores
